Attendance: Regular school attendance is essential for a student to make the most of his or her education—to benefit from teacher-led and school activities, to build each day's learning on the previous day's, and to grow as an individual. Absences from class may result in serious disruption of a student's mastery of the instructional materials; therefore, the student and parent should make every effort to avoid unnecessary absences. To receive credit or a final grade in a class, a student in kindergarten—grade 12 must attend at least 90 percent of the days the class is offered. A student involved in an extracurricular activity must notify his or her teachers ahead of time about any absences.

Tardies: Students are expected to be prompt to class and to be in the classroom before the tardy bell rings. If students are not in class when the tardy bell rings they will be counted tardy. Each campus develops procedures for late arrivals and early dismissals. In addition, each campus may institute procedures to address the tardy policy differently. A student, who misses more than 20 minutes late to any period of the day, will be considered absent. *Excessive tardies may result in an alternative placement. Five tardies or more within a 6- month period may result in truancy charges being filed with the juvenile courts. (TEC 25.095) Two tardies in one day = may be placed in AC for one day.

Late work: All homework is due at the beginning of class, if not turned in when requested it is considered one day late. Late work will be graded based on district guidelines. 30 points will be taken off if the homework is late and will not be accepted more than one class period late.

When absent, the student is afforded the number of days missed plus one additional day to turn in makeup work. [A/B Block Example: A student misses Monday and Tuesday of the week and he/she returns on Wednesday of that same week. Student work from Mondays absence would be considered late after Friday and student work from Tuesdays absent would be considered late after the following Monday.] A student who does not make up assigned work within the time allotted by the teacher will receive a grade of zero for the assignment

Re-test: Students who fail an assignment in the "TEST" column of the grade book will be allowed to take an alternate test, and will receive a maximum of a 70%. Students will have to make arrangements with me to schedule it. ALL students choosing to retake have one week from receiving their grade to retest. Before students may take the alternate test, they should come to tutorials to go over the first test material. Midterms and final exams are not eligible for retakes.

Academic Dishonesty:

Academic dishonesty—cheating or plagiarism—is not acceptable. Cheating includes the copying of another student's work—homework, class work, test answers, etc.—as one's own. Plagiarism is the use of another person's original ideas or writing without giving credit to the true author. It is also dishonest to use an online translator that translates sentences and full phrases. The only accepted online dictionary is www.wordreference.com. A student found to have engaged in academic dishonesty will be subject to loss of credit for the work in question, as well as disciplinary penalties, according to the Student Code of Conduct. Students who have cheated on any assignment will receive a zero and will not be allowed any opportunity to retake, redo, or take an alternate version of the assignment

Ipads, Phones and Electronic Devices

Technology is a great tool and adds much to the classroom however it can also cause a great distraction. Electronic devices are not to be worn or used unless directed by the instructor and for use in support of the assignment and curriculum. The use of electronics outside of instructional direction is prohibited and will be treated as a disciplinary issue.

Grades: The Six Weeks' Average

According to district policy, the MHS LOTE Department has adopted a common averaging system for use in all LOTE courses. Students' grades will test proficiency in five language skill areas: Listening, Speaking, Reading, Writing, and Culture. Three kinds of grades may be earned: Test grades, Listening/Speaking grades, and Daily grades. Tests are periodic, concentrated exams or projects that test the student's mastery of all five skills on a given topic, for example Food and Cooking. Major Essays may also be counted as Tests. Listening/Speaking grades cover dialogues, monologues, role-plays, listening comprehension activities graded in class, and class participation. Daily grades cover homework, some class work, and quizzes. Projects and Presentations may have components graded in any or several of the above categories. The Food and Cooking, for example, contains 2 major grades, an oral Listening/Speaking grade and a major essay Test grade.

The Six Weeks' Average consists of a composite average of

40% Test grades

35% Listening/Speaking grades

25% Daily grades

At the end of the Semester, students will take a comprehensive Semester Exam. This exam will be averaged with the 3 Six Weeks' averages to produce the Semester Average as explained below:

Semester Exam— 20% First Six Weeks— 26.6% Second Six Weeks— 26.6% Third Six Weeks— 26.6%

Tutoring: Tutorials will take place in Room T-10 after school on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 3:00-4:00. Students will need to confirm an appointment before tutoring. Tutorials can also be scheduled apart from these given times, as long as an appointment is made beforehand.

Tentative Course Schedule: Time frames are tentative and may be changed due to circumstances beyond the teacher's control. I also reserve the right to move the due date **back** of any assignment for educational reasons.
